

### A BRIEF HISTORY OF SMITH & WESSON Pt. 2

WHILE THE .22 POCKET PISTOL WAS A SUCCESS, THE PARTNERS RECOGNIZED THE NEED FOR A LARGER BORE WEAPON. THE PROBLEM BOILED DOWN TO THE SOFT COPPER CARTRIDGE CASES. UPON FIRING THE CASE WOULD SWELL AND BIND THE ACTION PREVENTING CYLINDER ROTATION. IN 1861, JUST 3 MONTHS INTO THE CIVIL WAR, S&W BROUGHT OUT THE MODEL 2. IT WAS A LARGER FRAME NEAR DUPLICATE OF THE MODEL 1 .22'S BUT A DESIGN CHANGE ALLOWED THE CYLINDER TO ROTATE DESPITE THE SWELLING OF THE NOW .32 CALIBER RIMFIRE ROUND. LIKE THE .22 ROUND THAT PRECEDED IT, THE .32 LONG RIMFIRE UTILIZED A HEALED BULLET...THE EXPOSED BULLET DIAMETER WAS THE SAME AS THE CASE DIAMETER...EXACTLY LIKE MODERN .22 AMMO.

THOUGH NEVER OFFICIALLY ADOPTED BY THE USA OR THE CSA, THE NEW REVOLVER, WAS COMMONLY REFERRED TO AS THE "ARMY MODEL", IT WAS SO SUCCESSFUL THAT BY THE END OF 1861 THE FACTORY HAD TO CEASE TAKING ORDERS HAVING 3 YEARS WORTH OF PRODUCTION ALREADY PRE-SOLD. IN THE 10 YEARS IT WAS PRODUCED THE MODEL 2 SAW OVER 77,000 REVOLVERS SOLD IN 4 BARREL LENGTHS. THIS MODEL IS REFERRED TO TODAY AS THE "OLD ARMY MODEL".

DURING THE EARLY WAR YEARS THE COMPANY ALSO DESIGNED ANOTHER .32 RIMFIRE, THE FRAME SIZE BEING SMALLER THAN THE MODEL 2 BUT LARGER THAN THE MODEL 1 NATURALLY IT WAS LABELED THE MODEL 11/2! THE NEW 5 SHOT WAS DESIGNED TO SHOOT THE NEW .32 RIMFIRE SHORT BUT THE CYLINDER WOULD ALSO TAKE THE .32 LONG FOR INCREASED POWER. THUS IT WAS THE FIRST REVOLVER EVER DESIGNED TO SHOOT MORE THAN 1 SPECIFIC ROUND. THE PROBLEM WAS THE FACTORY WAS SWAMPED WITH ORDERS FOR THE MODEL 2'S AND HAD NO PRODUCTION FACILITIES AVAILABLE TO MAKE THE MODEL 1 1/2 . A MIDDLETOWN, CONNECTICUT COMPANY, SAVAGE AND KING, WAS CONTRACTED TO MANUFACTURE PARTS FOR THE 1½ WHICH WERE THEN ASSEMBLED BY SMITH & WESSON. FROM 1865 TO 1868 THE COMPANY PRODUCED 26,300 OF THE GUNS. JUST AS THE MODEL 1-2 FLAT FRAMED, OCTAGON BARRELED .22'S MORPHED INTO THE ROUND BARRELED, BIRDSHEAD GRIPPED MODEL 1-3'S, IN 1868 THE MODEL 1 1/2 RECEIVED THE SAME TREATMENT AND BECAME THE MODEL 1 1/2 2ND SERIES. AFTER PRODUCING NEARLY 101,000 OF THE 1 1/2'S THE LAST OF THE SMITH TIP-UPS LEFT THE FACTORY IN 1875. INTERESTINGLY FOR COLLECTORS, TOWARD THE END OF PRODUCTION S&W USED PARTS LEFT OVER FROM 1ST SERIES GUNS (OBTAINED FROM SAVAGE AND KING) ON SOME 2ND SERIES GUNS...RESULTING IN MIXED SERIES HYBRIDS. WITH CESSATION OF M 1 ½ PRODUCTION THE ERA OF THE TIP-UP REVOLVER WAS OVER.
