The Crazy and Confusing World of Cartridge Nomenclature

Oh those sensible Europeans, their ammo is so precisely named. First the caliber in millimeters such as 7.62 mm, then the length of the brass (or steel, zinc, polymer,etc) such as 39mm. Thus we have 7.62 x 39. recognizable to millions as the venerable AK 47 and SKS round. Or how about 6.5 x55 ? The Mauser label doesn't even need to be there to know which ammo is being refered to 7 x 57? 9 x 19? 7.62 x 51? 7.62 x 53R (the R stands for rimmed). Even the Japanese were on board with their 7.7 x 58 and 6.5 x 50. Even truly exotic cartridges are are cinch to figure out, like the 11.7 x 51R for the Danish Remington Rolling Block or the 12.17 x 44R for the Swedish version. No problem right? Now let's cross the ocean and see what happened when British Imperial System was used : there are no fewer than 48 ".22 caliber" cartridges listed in Barnes "Cartridges of the World". None have any cartridge length indicated other than subjective description like short, long , extra-long, etc. Most don't indicate whether they are rimfire or center-fire, some have fun names like Zipper, Hornet, Accelerator, Cheetah, Donaldson Wasp, Mashburn Bee, Swift, Spitfire, Viper, Yellow Jacket, Hawk and of course the Maldog just to name a few. Confused yet? Try the so named .218, .221 , .222, .223, .225, .22-250, and .220 Swift . They all use bullets of .224 caliber. Only Weatherby got it right with their .224 WM.

Older blackpowder era cartridges did a fair job of designation by indicating caliber (approximate) followed the measured grains of black powder in the case. So we get .44-40, .38-40, 32-20. .25-20, .45-70, .45-90, .45-120, etc. one problem is the caliber designation isn't always accurate. The .44-40 uses a .427 to .429 diameter bullet while the .38-40 uses a bullet measuring .401. The .32-20 Winchester uses .312 while the .32 Winchester special used .321 bullets. The .45's are all closer to . 46 at .458.

Moving away from black powder , the wonderful .30-30 Winchester was the first American small-bore smokeless-powder cartridge and it just happened to use a .30 caliber bullet (.308) and 30 grains of smokeless. It marked the end of an era however as new smokeless powder rounds began to be identified by several other factors. The .30-03 and famous .30-06 were named for bullet diameter (.308) and the 2 digit year of introduction ie. 1903 and 1906 respectively. Manufacturer's names and cartridge designer's names are frequently used as identifiers take .17 Remington, .250 Savage, .257 Roberts, .32-20 Winchester (now smokeless but still uses old designation) .376 Styer, .416 Ruger and of course the many Norma and Weatherby cartridges.

So welcome to the wonderful and confusing world of cartridges...we've just scratched the surface. Next time we'll delve into the origins of our popular handgun rounds and discover why a .38 is really a .36 and the .36's were really .35's, oh and the .35 S& W yeah really a .309. How about the very popular .32 Auto? Yup, a .308. All is not lost however, the .40 S&W actually measures .400.
